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




US Endometrial Cancer Statistics by Race/Ethnicity

The Black-White mortality gap in endometrial cancer is **one of the largest** in all of cancer care in the US.

Rank	Cancer	Black:White Mortality Rate Ratio
1	Stomach	2.3
2	Multiple Myeloma	2.3
3	Uterine (Endometrial)	2.0 (1.6-2.9)
4	Cervix	1.8
5	Breast	1.4
6	Colorectal	1.3

Dr. Ashley Felix is an Assistant Professor at the Ohio State University College of Public Health. Her research focusing on identifying which factors put people at risk for different endometrial cancer subtypes, and what we can do about these factors. She also researches the molecular mechanisms of these relationships. Her work has specifically focused on women diagnosed with aggressive endometrial cancer, which is characterized by racial disparities.


ECANA attends the PCORI Annual Conference






